### **Taking Teaching Seriously: How to Teach Treaty Interpretation, Prof. Joseph Weiler, Lauterpacht Centre for International Law, 11 October 2019, 13.00-15.00**

The Eli Lauterpacht Lecture was established after Sir Eli's death in 2017 to celebrate his life and work. This lecture will take place on the first Friday lecture of the Centre at the start of the Michaelmas Term in any academic year.

#### **Lecture summary**

For many years now Research & Scholarship have become the Alpha and Omega of academic life. Think of the Research Excellence Framework and the cascading effect it has had on the life of UK universities. Think of all other forms of rankings, institutional and individual, which try (miserably) to quantify quality of research, institutional and individual and the effect this has on the recruitment of staff and students and on the career paths of young scholars. Think of money -- public funding, research grants and the like and the impact this, mammon, has on academic life. Though we continue to pay lip service to the importance of teaching, nobody can question that it ranks much lower in how we rank academic excellence.

The most coveted appointment as a Research Professor (with less or no teaching) sends an undeniable signal and one does not get a grant which enables a buyout from research in order to focus on teaching. Most professors and lecturers fulfill their teaching duties faithfully, but it is a duty and few, especially in the major Research Universities think of their vocation as educators. One does not naturally think of teaching as worth spending the time, thought and creativity in the same manner we do on our "research". Most dream of being

Great Scholars, not great teachers and educators. And if they did, the system would not prize them for that. Distinguished Lectures are typically meant to be an occasion to engage with the latest and most profound in scholarship. A good part of my scholarly effort is dedicated to thinking about how knowledge, insight and creativity can be translated and brought into the classroom. By this I do not mean rhetoric or teaching techniques, or teaching how to do research but the most profound and effective way of engaging our students with the actual content of that which it is our responsibility to teach. A well designed and creative class should, but does not in today's academia, count as much as a well designed and creative article. Taking this route will not, I hope, only honor the memory of Eli Lauterpacht in the most meaningful way I can think of, but perhaps also make a more lasting contribution than any 'scholarly' lecture.

### **Professor Weiler**

Professor Weiler is University Professor at NYU Law School and Senior Fellow at the Center for European Studies at Harvard. Until recently he served as President of the European University Institute, Florence. Prof Weiler is Co-Editor-in-Chief of the European Journal of International Law (EJIL) and the International Journal of Constitutional Law (ICON).

The Raoul Wallenberg Institute is currently seeking candidates for the position as Programme Officer in Lund, Sweden to work on the Institute's programmes in Asia (Regional Asia Programme and/or China Programme). A local contract will be offered to the selected candidate. The position is full-time, with start after summer. The initial contract will be signed for a period of one year, with possible extension. The position is subject to funding availability.

The exact range of the work will be decided based on the selected candidates profile and programme needs at the time of recruitment. However, the Programme Officer's primary responsibilities are to ensure that relevant components of RWI's programmes in Asia are planned, implemented and followed up on so as to achieve expected results. The Programme Officer will also have an important role in the further development of the programmes and in pursuing related initiatives for strengthening RWI cooperation in Asia.

### **Main Tasks and Responsibilities**

- Develop and monitor programme activities and budgets, ensuring that budgetary resources are efficiently utilised to achieve expected results

- Prepare narrative reports to analyse the results of activities carried out

The position will involve frequent travel to programme sites across Asia to facilitate the implementation of programme objectives, and to assess and report on programme developments and results. At times, the workload can be high.

### **CAT - Constructive Advanced Thinking, Zukunftskolleg and Partner Institutes for Advanced Studies (Deadline 5 September 2019)**

**Goals:** CAT is an open international call designed to foster interdisciplinary research teams of young promising individuals wishing to address emergent societal issues with fresh ideas. Its aim is as follows:

- Supporting international research teams, composed of early career researchers, to conduct fundamental research with the goal to provide solution-oriented ideas to address issues that put our societies at risk.
- Fostering the transformation of these ideas into real-world action and of these teams into future leading networks of advanced thinking.

CAT projects should address an emerging societal issue, with the aim to chart pathways for action. Stakeholder organizations (policymakers, industries, NGOs...) interested in addressing



the issue with fundamental research are welcome to participate in a CAT project and can be represented in the team.

Following the policy of the participating institutes, the researchers retain the intellectual property rights to their work.

### **Support**

CAT will provide teams of early career researchers (three to five persons, possibly including a stakeholder) time and space for thought and discussion in the best research environments Europe has to offer. #### **Themenstellung**

Einschneidende Ereignisse der jüngsten Vergangenheit haben die Weltordnung wie wir sie bisher kannten vor größte Herausforderungen gestellt: der Syrien-Krieg, der Brexit, die Annexion der Krim, die Wahl Donald Trumps zum Präsidenten der USA und die darauf folgenden politischen Richtungsänderungen (u.a. Rückzug aus dem Pariser Klimaabkommen, Handelsstreitigkeiten, Austritt aus der UNESCO) sowie das Wiedererstarken autoritärer und nationalistischer Bewegungen und Parteien in Europa und in der Welt. Sie alle erschüttern das Vertrauen in die Bedeutung des Multilateralismus und gefährden die Integrität des internationalen Systems und damit auch der Vereinten Nationen.

Darüber hinaus erfordern neue oder (wieder-)erstarkte Phänomene und Tendenzen eine eingehende Betrachtung sowie innovative Anpassungs- und Regelungsstrategien. Zu nennen sind hier so unterschiedliche Aspekte wie die fortschreitende Digitalisierung, die globale Migrationsbewegung, der Klimawandel, aber auch terroristische Aktivitäten, einschließlich der absichtlichen Zerstörung von Kulturerbe u.a. in Syrien. Auch sie stellen nicht nur für die staatliche Integrität, sondern auch für die persönliche Integrität vieler Menschen eine große Herausforderung dar.

Die Bedeutung von „Integrität“ in diesem Zusammenhang ist vielfältig. Ebenso vielfältig sind auch die rechtlichen und politischen Implikationen, die sich daraus ergeben. Sie sollen den Rahmen für das Forschungskolloquium bilden. Potentielle Fragestellungen könnten sich insbesondere in diesen drei Themenblöcken ergeben.

#### **1. Unverletzlichkeit von Staaten / staatliche Souveränität**

(Völker-)Rechtswissenschaftler denken beim Begriff der „Integrität“ wohl zuallererst an die territoriale Integrität (auch territoriale Unversehrtheit), wie sie in Art. 2 (4) UN-Charta festgelegt ist. In diesem Zusammenhang bieten sich Fragen zum aktuellen Status des

Gewaltverbots sowie solche zu Begriff oder Inhalt des Grundsatzes der staatlichen Souveränität an.

- Inwieweit hat sich das Verständnis von staatlicher Souveränität gewandelt?
- Erodiert das völkerrechtliche Gewaltverbot?
- Fragestellungen im Zusammenhang mit Cyberwarfare

## **2. persönliche bzw. körperliche Integrität**

Auf persönlicher Ebene kommt dem Begriff eine weitere Bedeutung zu. Hier geht es vor allem um die (körperliche) Unversehrtheit von Individuen, die maßgeblich vom Verhalten der Mitmenschen sowie den gesellschaftlichen und (völker-)rechtlichen Rahmenbedingungen abhängt.

- Wie kann der Schutz der persönlichen Freiheit(en) angesichts aktueller
- Herausforderungen, wie z.B. Digitalisierung, gewährleistet werden?
- Was bedeutet die Zerstörung von Kulturerbe für die kulturelle Integrität bzw. die
- Identität der betroffenen Bevölkerung?

## **3. Makellosigkeit, Unbescholtenheit und Unbestechlichkeit von Staaten und der Vereinten Nationen**

Nach dem philosophischen Humanismus fordert Integrität, dass die tatsächliche Lebenspraxis persönlichen Werten und Idealen entspricht. Reden und Handeln ist geleitet von Werten und Normen und bleibt für andere damit verlässlich und vorhersehbar. Übertragen auf das Völkerrecht im Allgemeinen und die Vereinten Nationen im Speziellen, ergeben sich in diesem Zusammenhang zahlreiche interessante Frage- und Problemstellungen:

- Welche Bedeutung hat die Immunität der UN und ihrer Organe (z.B. Sicherheitsrat,
- UN-Friedenstruppen), ist sie noch zeitgemäß?
- Inwieweit wird das Völkerrecht heute (bewusst) missbräuchlich gebraucht?
- Gibt es eine Krise des Völkerrechts? Inwieweit haben die unterschiedlichen Akteure dazu beigetragen?

Die genannten Themen dienen der Veranschaulichung und sind keinesfalls abschließend.

### **Organisatorischer Rahmen des Kolloquiums**

Das 9. ### **INSIDE Workshop on Compliance theories in International Human Rights Law, Aix Marseille University, Aix-en-Provence, France, 2 April 2020 (Deadline 20 September 2019)**

The Institute for International Humanitarian Studies (CERIC, UMR DICE 7318, AMIDEX) of Aix-en-Provence Law School welcomes submissions for the forthcoming INSIDE Workshop in Compliance Theories to be held at Aix-en-Provence Law School on 2 April 2020.

#### **The INSIDE (International Socialization and Democracy Through International Law) Project**

The fundamental postulate of the INSIDE rests on the idea that international law is a tool used to socialize States. The doctrine attempts to identify, by invoking both theories of international relations and those of international law, the ways and effects of such socialization. The research we intend to carry out finds its foundations in this context and is based on a broad empirical field on international human rights law. One of the objectives of the project is to construct analytical tools, including for the purpose of assessing and measuring compliance with commitments States.

#### **Workshop's focus**

Most of the international lawyers continue to believe that international law matters, in the sense that it affects or influences the conduct of States. Although the legal scholarship that aims at theorizing why and when States comply with international law has been productive, there is no agreement on one coherent compliance theory. The doctrine of theories of compliance is concerned with all sorts of empirical fields in international law. Among these empirical fields, international human rights law is an important subject of conceptual or sometimes empirical studies.

#### **The workshop aims to address three major research questions:**

- Why do States agree to ratify multilateral treaties and agreements in international human rights law?

States remain sovereign in their international commitments. They choose to ratify a treaty or not, and to denounce it or not. It is this sovereign freedom of each State which makes this matter interesting and difficult to grasp. We believe that understanding the factors influencing States in their choices is particularly crucial in this period of instability in international relations. In addition, human rights institutions are regularly criticized and attacked by States while their legitimacy is often questioned.

- Why do States often agree to amend their conduct in accordance with their obligations under international human rights law?

Some States, when ratifying a treaty on international human rights law, ensure that their domestic law complies with international standards, or agree to amend certain behaviours. Admittedly, most treaties require such adaptation of domestic law and internal policies in accordance with the treaty. But are States simply obeying a prescriptive norm, or is there a more profound motivation? The second part of this question, in particular, helps to anticipate the behaviour of a State which is about to ratify a human rights treaty.

- How to assess and to measure compliance by States with their treaty commitments in international human rights law?

This question refers not to the technical mechanisms for the execution and implementation of judgments and recommendations, but rather to the real motivations of States which agree or disagree with their implementation. For instance, before the Human Rights Committee some States agree to fully implement the recommendations, others implement them only partially, while others choose not to respond at all. This observation can also be made with regards to the regional human rights courts. Unfortunately, for the moment there is not any tool to understand these variations in behaviour.

We welcome a wide variety of paper proposals in the field of compliance theories that fit within one of the workshop's questions.

Subject areas of interest for submission include, but are not limited to:

- Compliance Theories (realism, institutionalism, new liberalism, constructivism, transnational legal process, etc.);
- Compliance in practice;
- Measurement of compliance with International Human Rights Law.

The aim of the workshop is to bring together young researchers in order to present their work in a supportive and collaborative environment and engage in an in-depth discussion about the practical impact of the compliance theories. The participants will present their research and receive feedback and comments from their peers.

### **Submission of Abstracts**

The Committee welcomes abstracts from any researcher addressing the theme of the workshop.

Please submit 300-500 words abstract (in English or French), your CV and information regarding your current institutional affiliation(s) to [toinsideworkshop2020@gmail.com](mailto:toinsideworkshop2020@gmail.com) before 20 September 2019. The selection of proposals is based on the quality of the abstract, as well as its capacity to engage with the other proposals of the panels.

Selected proposals will be announced by the end of September 2019. Successful participants will be required to submit the paper they wish to present at the workshop (no more than 10 000 words) by 2 March 2020. Papers can encompass empirical approaches, theoretical discussions and case studies. Submitted papers must not be under consideration by any journal or accepted for future publication. Accepted papers will be considered for publication in the Quebec Journal of International Law (QJIL).

The conference will gather critical, original and provocative perspectives on gendered tensions in the law. ### **Publication**

The papers presented at the conference will be offered the possibility of submission for publication in a special issue of the European Journal of Legal Studies (EJLS), a peer-reviewed and open-access journal. During the conference, presenters will receive information for the submission of manuscripts to the EJLS. The publication is not automatic, as manuscripts will be subject to the usual procedure of double-blind peer-review, involving the EUI's entire scientific community (professors, fellows, researchers, as well as alumni).

## **The International Protection of Cultural Heritage Conference, University of Milan, Milan, 4-5 December 2019 (Deadline 1 September 2019)**

The Department of International Legal Political and Historic Studies (DILPHS) will host a Conference on the Topic: The International Protection of Cultural Heritage: New Trends in Restitution and Return of Cultural Property (Milan, 4-5 December 2019). The main purpose of the conference is to discuss recent issues in the field of fight against illicit traffic and new trends in the restitution and return of cultural property.

### **The topic and the conference**

Large-scale and systematic destruction of cultural sites, illicit excavations, looting and smuggling of cultural property by armed groups, directly or indirectly connected to terrorist associations, highlight a new dimension of illicit traffic in cultural property. The present public and private international law regime does not provide fully effective protection to face these new challenges. The Conference takes stock from the existing complex normative body, including UNESCO Conventions, EU regulations, and the relevant practice resulting from court decisions and arbitral awards, as well as the most recent developments, like the adoption of the Sarr-Savoy Report, urged by French President Macron, on the restitution of cultural property to African countries, or the resolutions of the UN Security Council.

The work of the conference will be spread over two days, an afternoon on the first day and the morning of following day, and will consist in two sessions per day. Part of the speakers will be selected through this call for proposals in order to ensure the participation of young scholars and researchers.

**Solidarity-The Quest for Founding Utopias of International Law, European Society of International Law Research Forum, University of Catania, Italy, 23-24 April 2020 (Deadline 30 September 2019)**

The 2020 ESIL Research Forum will take place on Thursday 23 and Friday 24 April 2020 at the Department of Law, University of Catania, Italy. The ESIL Research Forum is a scholarly conference that promotes engagement with research in progress by members of the Society. It has a small and intensive format. The Forum targets scholars at an early stage of their careers. Approximately 15-25 paper submissions will be selected. During the Forum, selected speakers will receive comments on their presentations from members of the ESIL Board and invited experts.

The 2020 Forum will address the topic ‘Solidarity: The Quest for Founding Utopias of International Law’.

Solidarity is a founding utopia of international law. It has long appeared in the legal discourses of leading international law scholars as a value and political concept incorporated into international legal norms and evidenced in multilateral and bilateral treaties as an essential condition of interstate cooperation. As a principle of international law, it is mostly identifiable through the trust and confidence shown by states to one another in order to reap the mutual benefits of cooperation. In a broader sense, it also reveals a highly ambiguous ethical ideal – not extraneous to the ‘civilizing mission’ – of a world order of interdependent states and communities addressing shared needs in a spirit of global cooperation and mutual responsibility.

In response to the new global challenges faced by today’s international legal system, solidarity has acquired a special prominence with unprecedented developments in various fields of international law (e.g. trade law, environmental law, humanitarian law, disaster law, health law) while its utopian dimension has been stressed and expanded towards new directions.

The 2020 ESIL Research Forum aims to inspire thoughtful reflections on the genealogy of international solidarity by focusing on the actors, norms and processes influencing its evolution over time. Beyond the search for definitions, the scope of the Forum is to explore transformations and practical manifestations of this longstanding principle in the international legal community. Special attention will be given to international solidarity as interpreted by international and domestic courts and tribunals and to the analysis of some key areas where solidaristic paradigms have led to either positive outcomes or controversial repercussions.

**Preference will be given to proposals in one of the following areas**

1. The historical boundaries of international solidarity
2. Solidarity and private law analogies
3. The invention of European solidarity
4. A human rights-based solidarity? Universal vs regional approaches

5. Peace and security: solidarity and the United Nations
6. International solidarity in emergency situations
7. Social solidarity economy and sustainable development
8. Civil society and transnational solidarity
9. International solidarity and burden-sharing: migration and refugee law
10. International solidarity and current trends: populism, nationalism vs multilateralism

Abstracts (of no more than 750 words) should be submitted to 2020esil.rf.catania@lex.unict.it by Monday 30 September 2019. Please include the following information with your abstract: your name, affiliation, email address, whether you are an ESIL member, plus a one-page curriculum vitae.

Successful applicants will be notified by email by 4 November 2019. Complete paper drafts will be required by 19 February 2020. Papers may in due course be published in the ESIL SSRN Conference Paper Series.

All those who take part in the Forum are expected to be ESIL members at the time of their participation.

Selected speakers will be expected to bear the costs of their own travel and accommodation. Some ESIL travel grants and ESIL carers grants will be available to offer partial financial support to speakers who have exhausted other potential sources of funding. Speakers will be informed of several hotels that offer preferential rates to Research Forum participants. Lunch will be provided on both days, and a dinner for presenters, commentators and ESIL Board members will be hosted on the evening of Thursday 23 April 2020.

The deadline for submission of abstracts is Monday 30 September 2019.

**European ways of inciting and containing armed conflict, 1648-2020, European Society of International Law's Interest Group on the History of International Law, Ca' Foscari University of Venice, 24-26 June 2020 (Deadline 2 December 2019)**

The history of Europe is as much about violence and divisions – including religious wars, national clashes and ideological conflicts – as it is about shared cultural, social and economic accomplishments. If war has been such a constant presence in the history unfolding on the continent, the incessant efforts to limit its destructiveness are also an undeniable fact. It was such efforts that eventually led to the birth of Jus ad bellum and, ultimately, laid down the foundations of modern international law. From such a viewpoint, one might even find another definition of what European history might be. Some scholars have suggested that if war has structured a common European space, the containment of violence and the art of peacemaking have constituted 'Europe' in thought and practice.

##### **International Summer School "Current legal issues in post-conflict and transitional societies", Middle East Technical University Northern Cyprus Campus & University of Sarajevo, Kalkanli, North Cyprus, 4-11 September 2019 (Deadline 30 August 2019)**

The concept of "post-conflict and transitional societies" is a heritage of the 20th Century. It is also one of the major issues of international politics and international law that seek to prevent recurrence of such internal crises. Studies on post-conflict studies mainly focus on state-building and transitional justice. Further, the concept of post-conflict and transitional societies is a tremendously complex issue that requires understanding internal dynamics of these societies from the point of different disciplines. Many societal issues still endure in post-conflict and societies in transition, and legal problems, such as those regarding constitutional reforms, institution building, federalism, human rights, legal culture, gender, peace, security, impunity, transitional justice etc, are of capital importance among others. In recent years a notable literature has developed on peacebuilding efforts in these societies. This initiative aims at compiling those studies and bringing together academics focused on post-conflict societies from different disciplines and to introduce a holistic knowledge of studies on post-conflict societies.

Post-conflict societies have common problems, and therefore we believe that an international cooperation and a joint organization is crucial in order such an initiative to meet success. To this end the University of Sarajevo, and the METU Northern Cyprus are partnering to set up an international summer school for graduate and postgraduate students in Kalkanli, North Cyprus.

The theme of this year is "STATE BUILDING AND DIVISION OF POWERS IN POST-CONFLICT SOCIETIES." Interdisciplinary and comparative studies on recent cases of the post-conflict societies, in a range from Cyprus, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Myanmar, Germany to various Balkan, African and Middle Eastern countries will be central to the summer school.

At the end of the program, participants will receive a joint certificate from the METU NCC and the University of Sarajevo.

**Politics and Law – An Interdisciplinary Dialogue between Social and Legal Sciences, Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin and University of Oxford, Berlin, 28-30 November 2019 (Deadline 1 September 2019)**

Law and politics are inseparably intertwined. From a rule-of-law perspective, legal norms regulate public, and increasingly private, institutions as well as legislative and executive actions. In its function as an arbiter of the political realm, thus, law seeks to confirm or constrain politics and the political, its actors, actions, narratives and images. However, legal norms not only regulate political actions, but social and political actions are also the norms' precondition. One also must consider, thus, (legal) norms as socially and historically engrained in institutional settings, at times as the formal and informal "cultures of law". Here, the political character of law can be analysed through a "longue durée" perspective, taking the historicity of law and historic as well as contemporary battles over the meaning of law into account. The focus on law and politics is one that explicitly asks for questions of redistribution in society: who benefits, who loses, who is harmed?

While jurisprudence holds on an institutional understanding of law and normativity, often focussing on "law in the books" and legal doctrine, social sciences such as history, sociology, anthropology, cultural studies and political sciences have a broader view by looking at the formation of law in political contexts as well as at its social function and development, sometimes lacking, however, a doctrinal understanding of positive law.

By combining the different academic perspectives on the implicit and explicit relationship between law and politics, the Winter School aims at shedding light on respective disciplinary blind spots, or questions not posed yet, in order to foster a dialogue on different methodological and theoretical approaches of socio-legal research. By switching perspectives and leaving the comfort zone of one's own academic subfield, participants will learn more about the interdisciplinary potential of their work within the thematic realm of law and politics and, thus, how to fill the often evoked but rarely applied concept of interdisciplinarity with content.

The Winter School provides a space to discuss the participants' projects with fellow PhD students, postdoctoral fellows and renowned scholars of socio-legal research from different academic traditions (France, UK, Germany and the U.S.). Moreover, thematic, methodological and strategic academic topics are covered by workshops and panel discussions on interdisciplinary working on the relation of law and politics, the methodological challenges of socio-legal research and writing and publishing in an international context.

**Applications**

PhD students from social and legal sciences as well as the humanities working theoretically and/or empirically or from the standpoint of legal doctrine on the politics and law nexus are invited to apply. The application deadline is 1 September 2019. Please submit your application by email to: winterschool19@cmb.hu-berlin.de. Participants will be selected and informed by 15 September 2019. Please note that there will be a small quota of participants who are selected directly by the organising institutions. All participants are asked to hand in a poster for the presentation at the Winter School by 1 November 2019.

The event will be conducted in English. Your application should include: Letter of motivation (max. 1 page), Brief synopsis of your project (max.1page), CV, including a publication list if applicable (max. 2 pages)

### **Human Rights Violations in Germany: Gender, Colonial Crimes & Transnational Corporations, HU Berlin, 6-24 January 2020 (Deadline 15 November 2019)**

Can human rights be universal? What exclusions and injustices are inherent in law that treats everyone “equal” in unequal societies? How is it that some human rights have been finally recognized, whereas others are continuously dismissed? Which actors are involved and why? What role do power and knowledge play? Who ‘wrote’ ‘the’ history of human rights? Who was excluded from this process?

Departing from an interdisciplinary perspective the Winter School will give an insight into Critical Human Rights Discourse and Litigation in Germany. On the basis of concrete human rights cases students will learn about the different bodies and instruments of human rights protection in Germany, their practical advantages, challenges and inherent exclusions.

By focusing on specific sectors (Gender, Racism and Social Equality) and their intersectional effects students are taught to see the canon of rights protected within the legal system as constructed and thus embedded in social and political processes of deliberations on different levels. With the understanding that strategic human rights litigation is only one of the many tools used to forward social change and justice, we talk about how these legal strategies and instruments can and should be intertwined with grassroots political awareness campaigns, the creation of associations to strengthen visibility, investments in public relations and advocacy for change and justice within social movements. Studies concerning the impact of Strategic Public Litigation will be used in the discussion, potentially with representatives from NGOs involved in some of the relevant Public Interest Litigations.

### **Conference "Extraterritorial Human Rights Obligations in the Age of Reemerging Nationalism - Are They Really Justified?" University of Zurich, 21-22 November 2019**

The academic debate on the extraterritorial application of human rights is intense and sophisticated. In the last few years, it has often been taken for granted that such extraterritorial obligations on the part of states exist and the research focus has turned to their scope and the modes of implementing them. At the same time, some of the duty-bearers at stake still question their legitimacy. With rising nationalist tendencies in all parts of the world, this is unlikely to change soon. Furthermore, philosophical attacks on the idea

of human rights in general and their universality in particular have increased, backed prominently by revisionist historical work.

If extraterritorial application of human rights shall be realized and implemented in practice, it seems necessary to return to addressing the foundational question of their justifiability as well as counter arguments that promote a territorial limitation of states' human rights obligations. By combining legal and philosophical perspectives, this is the aim the workshop hopes to achieve.

Confirmed speakers include: Prof. David Cole (Georgetown University), Prof. Samantha Besson (Université de Fribourg), Prof. Marko Milanovic (University of Nottingham), Prof. Véronique Zanetti (University of Bielefeld), Prof. Matthias Mahlmann (University of Zurich).

### **Winter Course Programme, The Hague Academy of International Law, 6-24 January 2020 (registration open)**

The Winter Courses focus on International Law (both public and private) and take place over a period of 3 weeks. The Winter Courses follow the traditional structure of the Summer Courses and are comprised of a General Course and a series of Special Courses. The General Course is spread over the entire 3 weeks (15 hours).

#### **GENERAL COURSE (daily - morning - compulsory)**

This course highlights developments within the field of international law, and provides attendees with the opportunity to take a step backwards and, through an overall view and a comprehensive reflection, grasp the main lines of the discipline around which legal thinking is structured.

#### **SPECIAL COURSES (daily - morning - compulsory)**

These courses, consisting of 5 hours total spread out over one week, deal with a particular question or topic, and are given by professors who have studied the subject extensively and are specialists in the field.

#### **SEMINARS (weekly - afternoon - optional)**

All professors give seminars related to the subject of their course. During these interactive meetings, attendees have an opportunity to ask questions, to obtain additional information on the course, and to participate in discussions.

#### **DIRECTED STUDIES AND DIPLOMA (afternoon – admission upon selection)**

The Directed Studies are conducted under the guidance of a professor. They are specifically designed for high-level students, who wish to prepare themselves for the Diploma examination of the Academy, or who are simply interested to participate in seminars delving more deeply into questions of public or private international law without sitting for the examination. The latter consists of a five-hour written test on a subject that has both

theoretical and practical aspects. Candidates who pass this first part of the examination then have to take an oral examination.

Attendees of the new Winter Courses in January 2020 will furthermore be able to participate in an exceptional event – the "Hours of Crisis" simulation exercise: selected attendees will be invited to participate, on Saturday, January 11th, 2020, in the "Hours of Crisis" simulation exercise. During 8 hours, eight teams of attendees will be confronted with the simulation of a major international crisis and the legal and political questions that it generates, which they will have to answer on behalf of their "clients" (States, international organizations, companies). They will have to produce legal advice and participate in crisis negotiations. During a final meeting before a jury, they will have to share their analyzes and arguments. The jury will determine the best team and the best speakers. Hours of Crisis is a version of the "Day of Crisis" that was specifically created for the Academy.
